
Arizona has one of the worst homelessness crises in the nation, federal data shows

While nationwide homelessness rates remained almost unchanged between 2020 and 2022, Arizona saw a 23% increase in its unhoused population.

Tucson Pima Collaboration To End Homelessness

Health and Homelessness

Poor health can be a precipitating factor leading to homelessness

• Missing work can lead to loss of employment, which is often associated with health insurance coverage and stable income

Exacerbation of chronic conditions

• Lack of ability to purchase and store medications, difficulty maintaining a healthy and nutritious diet, barriers to accessing medical care and mental health support

Health and Homelessness

Increased rates of communicable diseases

• Higher rates of HIV, HCV, TB

A lack of shelter is a barrier to healing and recovery

• Frequent ED visits, hospital readmissions, poor health outcomes



Z-MANSION

Every Sunday, our members volunteer and team up with Z-Mansion, owned by Reverend Thomas Langdon Hill. Hill oversees a medical facility and resting area for the homeless within Z-Mansion, both of which we volunteer in. Additionally, every third week of the month our members complete Certified Community Health Specialist trainings. After attending 10 trainings, they are awarded with a CCHS title. MISSION: To coordinate outreach in the community to provide basic medical care and health education to individuals experiencing homelessness in Tucson while simultaneously providing undergraduate students with hands-on experience.



COMMUNITY RIDE-ALONGS

We collect food, clothing and basic hygeine and health amenities and compile them into care packages. Then, one Saturday morning a month, our members go out to homeless population clusters within Tucson and hand them out while also interacting with those individuals.







Female Services

- Women and individuals who are within age and capable of having children are eligible for services
- Teens are welcome

At Family Planning, women can get:

- Birth control methods Birth Control Pills, Intrauterine Device (IUD), Depo Provera Shot (DEPO), Implants, Condoms, Ring and Cycle Beads (Natural Family Planning)
- Emergency contraceptive pills Emergency contraceptive pills (ECPs), also known as the morning after pill, are available at our offices. If taken within 72 120 hours of unprotected sex (a condom breaks, pills are forgotten), they can greatly reduce the risk of pregnancy.
- Pregnancy testing and counseling
- Breast exams If abnormalities are detected, referrals are given to the Well Woman HealthCheck program.
- Examinations Pelvic and/or pap tests as needed.
- Abnormal Pap smear treatment If the results of your Pap Smear are abnormal, we will refer you to their Colposcopy Clinic or suggest a treatment plan according to your needs.
- STI Screening and Treatment Remember, many STIs have no symptoms.
- Counseling and education We want to give you all the information you need to make educated and healthy choices in planning a family.

Note that registration may close <u>30-90</u> minutes ahead of closing due to high patient demand.

Well Woman HealthCheck

The <u>Well Woman HealthCheck Program</u> & (WWHP) is a free breast and cervical cancer screening and diagnostic program for uninsured or underinsured women in Arizona.

To increase women's access to and utilization of quality screening and diagnostic services to decrease morbidity and mortality from breast and cervical cancer among women who are at risk due to age, medical conditions, income or inadequate access to medical care.

• Do I qualify? Requirements



Services provided:

- Mammogram
- Clinical breast exam
- Pap test and pelvic exam
- HPV testing
- Colposcopy, cryosurgery and LEEP
- Fine needle aspiration
- Biopsy
- Case management
- Referral for treatment, if needed
- Translation

Health and Wellness for All Arizonans

Well Woman HealthCheck Program - Eligibility

To qualify for the Well Woman HealthCheck Program, you must:

- Be a woman
- Be a resident of Arizona
- Be uninsured or underinsured (have insurance that does not cover the services offered by the WWHP or have a co-pay of \$100 or more for breast and cervical cancer screening and/or diagnostic services)



- Not have Medicare Part B
- Not be enrolled in the Arizona Health Care Cost Containment System (AHCCCS), which is Arizona's Medicaid program.
- For *breast cancer screening*, be 40 64 years old (or any age 21 and over if you have symptoms, such as pain, a lump, nipple discharge, an inverted nipple, etc.) and not recently diagnosed with breast cancer
- For *cervical cancer screening*, be 21 64 years old and not recently diagnosed with cervical cancer
- Not exceed the household income guidelines described below.

The Division of Child Care offers childcare assistance for:

- Low-income working families
- Teen parents enrolled in high school, GED, ESOL, or remedial education programs
- Residents of homeless or domestic violence shelters
- Individuals who are unable to care for their children due to a physical, mental or emotional condition
- Individuals who are unavailable to care for their children due to participation in court-ordered community service or participation in a drug treatment program
- Individuals who are currently receiving full time DES child care assistance.


